Manalo & White Opening up Towner Eastbourne for centenary year



Towner Eastbourne, home to a significant public art collection and the region's largest art gallery, with 100,000+ visitors a year, has dramatically expanded the reach and scope of their programme.

In close collaboration with Towner Eastbourne director & CEO Joe Hill and the Towner team and overlapping with the Levelling Up programme for the region and redevelopment work for the Devonshire Quarter within which the gallery sits, Manalo & White led an ambitious redesign of the original building designed in 2009 by Rick Mather Architects. The entire ground floor and second-floor restaurant were reconfigured to be lighter and brighter, allowing for a comfortable flow of people, ultimately making the gallery more open and inviting, as per the brief.

Subsequently, Towner has been able to host major exhibitions, craft fairs and now Turner Prize 2023, with additional facilities catering for workshops and community engagement to coincide with their centenary anniversary in 2023. The building now has much more of a convivial feel and a sense of shared space.

A generous and fluid foyer

Manalo & White's vision was to transform the foyer to be open and fluid, stitching together the variety of rooms around it, allowing visitors to feel the gallery being expanded, even though the overall square footage has not been increased. The design approach was informed by research work (conducted by <u>Adrian George</u>) which showed that visitors to museums and galleries will stay longer and engage with art further, if the spaces are welcoming and easy to navigate.

The ground floor cafe, which was previously hidden behind two sets of double doors, is now directly connected to the entrance foyer, making it more welcoming and accessible. A discrete retail area has been formed to one side, away from the busier thoroughfare of the foyer. The refurbished second floor restaurant includes a much-improved catering facility and up-to-date kitchen.

Natural light now reaches deeper into the building through a new window, which also reveals the interior to passersby on the street. New lockers, benches, bookcases and cabinets around the foyer have been designed to leave the space clutter-free.

To enlarge the foyer and create the retail area and much-needed storage, the two existing gallery spaces were reduced in size but improved in scale and proportion, with no loss of display area. They now have uninterrupted exhibition walls and are equipped with concealed sinks for workshops.

"How to welcome people into a gallery when they feel like art isn't for them? This is a design challenge that requires a certain kind of risk-taking, and playfulness, too. Our aim was to create a foyer which feels like a courtyard or village square, which stitches all the other spaces together; a convivial shared space where you can pause for a moment."

Destination restaurant

Manalo & White has transformed Towner Eastbourne's second-floor restaurant to be a destination in its own right, offering an elevated atmosphere and expanded food service, and continuing the welcoming openness of the ground floor.

The dining space is welcoming and can be adapted to host a variety of events and performances. The external balcony gives framed views of the South Downs. From the mellow colour palette to the subtle variety of textures of the joinery and materials, such as the oak uprights and deep green worktop of the bar, every detail works to exude generosity and fresh energy.

The central horseshoe bar anchors the flow. The array of globe lights brings warmth and animates the space, which can flexibly accommodate morning coffee or evening dinners. A large felt curtain in a mustard tone wraps around the walls to soften and improve acoustics.



Improved acoustics

As Towner Eastbourne has grown its audience, the acoustics of the building weren't suited to bustling crowds or hosting community workshops. Manalo & White integrated acoustic panels within the joinery and below the concrete ceilings, and added a wool felt curtain in the larger gallery space, which can be removed or drawn to dramatically reduce noise levels, if needed.

Gallery lighting

With services designers Ritchie + Daffin, the original lighting was repurposed to hang on suspended tracks, lower than the existing concrete beams, to improve flexibility and to avoid overshadowing. Reducing electricity consumption was another driver for adopting energy efficient LEDs.

Founded by Brian Greathead in 1999, Manalo & White is an architecture and interiors studio which weaves together pragmatism with playfulness. With an emphasis on user needs over spectacle and showmanship, the studio is known for its cross-sector versatility. It has developed an especially strong portfolio in the arts and culture sectors.
